

Reflections for Easter compiled by Deacon Bert Miller

Palm Sunday of Lent 2024.

Based on 'Words for the Lent & Easter Season' by Bishop Hugh Gilbert OSB

Once again we are now in the Lenten Season preparing us to Celebrate the Paschal Mystery of Easter. Lent is a season of being prepared by Christ for Christ and I sincerely hope these reflections will assist you on your Lenten journey.

To set the scene, the Byzantine Liturgy contains the following wording:

'O Faithful let us receive with joy the divinely inspired announcement of Lent. Let us wash ourselves with tears for its divine purification. Let us pray to see the fulfilment of Easter, the true Revelation. Let us prepare for adoring the Cross and Resurrection of Christ our God! O lover of man, do not deprive us of our expectation.'

Here we are at the beginning of Holy Week, the most important week in the Church's Year. Here we find ourselves going up to Jerusalem with the Church throughout the world and the Liturgy opens up pathways for us: the prayers, the readings and the ceremonies. Each of them is like a link on a computer: with the 'click' of faith we can access Easter with them, and Easter opens up to us, which is what we want. We want to meet Christ this week, Christ crucified and risen. We want to open ourselves to the power of his Cross and Resurrection. We want to let these in - into our own lives and into the world. We want Christ to become more real for us, and he will because the Liturgy works.

Jesus's Holy Week began on the back of a donkey, why should that be? It was a message, a fulfilment of an old Jewish prophecy from Ch9 of Zechariah: 'Rejoice heart and soul, daughter of Zion! Shout with gladness, daughter of Jerusalem! See how, your king comes to you; he is victorious, he is triumphant, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.' But why a donkey? If Jesus had ridden a horse, it would have been a sign of war and pride. But donkeys are for work, not war and Jesus is the Prince of Peace and humble, not proud. This can be put in another way. Jesus is about to let his enemies get the better of him, and finally have him crucified. From every human point of view he is about to make an ass of himself. That's what the disciples thought and it's what we would have thought and would have said such to him. There is actually an ancient anti-Christian graffiti from the Roman world that portrays this showing Jesus on the cross with the head of a donkey.

So, the donkey is Jesus himself and a donkey is the kind of disciple Jesus wants us to be. A donkey is a notoriously stubborn animal, liable to a lot of stick, not very beautiful and easy to ridicule. But it has a 'secret' - one day God incarnate rode on him into Jerusalem. So, let us be donkeys, lets be ready to be stubborn for him, laughed at for him, let us gladly carry his burden upon our backs. He's always entering Jerusalem, always coming to die and rise again. Each of us can be his donkey, each of us from all eternity, have been made, funny as we are, to be ridden by him. What donkeys have done superbly for centuries is carry things, heavy things, burdens, - uphill, downhill, over smooth ground and rough ground mile after mile. Let's be donkeys then, lets go on, head down, stubbornly, day after day, carrying on our backs the Blessed weight of Christ, of Faith and Catholic loyalty. Why?

Because the one we're carrying is the One who wins, the One who brings victory, the One who will ride us through the gates of death into the Heavenly Jerusalem.
